
Early Literacy Tips, Activities & More









tales' tip

When exploring WRITING by making marks, scribbling, drawing pictures, and telling stories, children are practicing reading skills. Allowing children to practice will later inspire them to write letters on purpose.

Explore colors and shapes through things kids love: rainbows and bubbles!

TALK

Rhyming games can be a fun way to help your children hear the smaller sounds in words, which will help them later to sound out words as readers. Try asking the question "Does cat rhyme with bat?" or "What rhymes with cat?".

WRITE

Scribbling is one way that kids prepare for writing. They are learning how to hold a writing tool, move their hand, and make the shape of letters. Use a marker to trace different letters or shapes you see in the scribbles.
