


## tales' tip

### PLAY

If your child has a stuffie, wrap it up in a blanket and sing it a lullaby! Encourage older children to sing to younger siblings when it is time for a nap; it will help both of them feel calmer and ready to rest.

### SING

#### The Hibernation Song

### TALK

We all have trouble falling asleep sometimes. Talk with your child about things we can do to help us feel sleepy and the things they enjoy at bedtime. Routines like bath, book, and then bed can be helpful in teaching the mind that it is time to rest.

### WRITE

Draw some acorns scattered over a piece of paper. Can your child be a squirrel and collect all the nuts by drawing a line from nut to nut with a pencil, crayon, or their finger?
