

Early Literacy Tips, Activities & More

It is more important to have frequent, short, positive experiences **READING** with your child than it is to meet a time requirement or finish a book. Two to three minutes at a time is fine, and every positive experience with books helps build a love of reading!

## SING

### Here's a Green Leaf

Here's a green leaf (show hand) And here's a green leaf, (show other hand) That you see, makes two. Here is a bud (cup hands together) That makes a flower; Watch it bloom for you! (open cupped hands gradually)

### Be A Seed

Be a seed, small and round (make a fist) Sprout, sprout up from the ground (open fingers) Shake your leaves for all to see (shake hands and body) Stretch your arms up, you're a tree! (raise arms high)
