


SING the song "Old MacDonald Had a Farm." To make it more playful, get up and act each animal out. For example, when you sing about ducks, stand up and quack, waddle, and flap your wings. Take it a step farther and ask your little one to choose what animal you do next!

TALK

TALK to your little ones about their favorite farm animals. Ask them what they know about the animal and why they like it. Then, come to the library to find a book about that animal!

SING

All Around the Farm

(tune: The Wheels on the Bus)

The cows on the farm go

"Moo, moo, moo,

All around the farm.

Repeat with other animals

The horses...neigh, neigh, neigh

WRITE

Ask your little on to draw their favorite farm animal. As they're drawing, ask them questions about the animal. What sound do they make? Does it have a name? When they're done—if they're able—help them WRITE out the name of the animal. Even if it's just scribbles, it will help them prepare to write.
