
Early Literacy Tips, Activities & More

SING

(Tune: Hush, Little Baby)

Poof! I'm an elephant, big in size. Poof! I'm an owl, with great big eyes. Poof! I'm a frog. I go hop, hop, hop. Poof! I'm a horse. Hear me clop, clip, clop. Poof! I'm a lion, Hear me roar! Poof! I'm an eagle, Watch me soar! Poof! I'm a mouse, squeak, squeak, squeak. Poof! I'm the best, I'm just me!

TALK

Practice saying "the magic words" like "please" and "thank you," and TALK about situations when and where you could use those words, such as at school or at the park.

WRITE

Use crayons, pencils, and other utensils to draw shapes like circles, squares, and rectangles. Then, think of what you could turn those shapes into. For example, a rectangle could become a truck, and a circle could become a snail.
